# **OUR MISSION & VISION**

Our mission is to help marginalised young people overcome barriers to participation in higher education and the creative and cultural industries.

Our vision is of a society where every young person gets a fair chance to flourish and every opportunity to contribute to the culture in which they live.

### **OUR AIMS**

- 1. Those in the poorest areas can access local support and opportunities.
- 2. Cultural and social capital is redistributed and available to all regardless of class, gender or ethnicity.
- 3. Gatekeepers acknowledge not just the diversity problem but the structural causes behind it and act to address these.
- 4. Marginalised young people are exposed to arguments for, and accurate information about, higher education and careers.

### WHY WE DO IT

Culture shapes our lives as much as politics. For a number of years now the government has been dismantling traditional ways working-class young people have made their way into academia and the industries that produce culture. In fact those industries are more socially exclusive than any other sector. In 2018 we collaborated with Create and academics from the Universities of Sheffield and Edinburgh on a report titled 'Panic! Social Class, Taste and Inequalities in the Creative Industries'. We learned that young people from privileged backgrounds are four times more likely to make it into the creative industries. This imbalance is in large part due to whether a young person can afford to take on unpaid work and if they have access to personal networks and insider knowledge.

# WHAT WE DO

We provide 16-18 year olds with a trained mentor working in their field of interest so that they can achieve their goals. This year of mentoring then acts as a gateway to our alternative 'old boy' network which offers young people real world opportunities and a supportive community until the age of 24.

We only work with the young people who are least likely to have the connections or a 'leg up' to study or work in the creative and cultural industries. The three most common criteria for our 2018 mentees were neither parent went to university (71%), household income below £25,000 p/a (56%) and person of colour (56%). Significantly 77% selected two or more eligibility criteria.






# LIFE CHANGING MENTORING

# Mentoring gives young people regular access to professionals across the creative industries.

We match young people with an expert mentor who shares their interests. Our mentors are at the top of their fields across the creative and cultural industries: they are journalists, architects, filmmakers, artists, historians and more. The students we work with gain tailored advice on university, apprenticeships and creative and cultural careers at a critical point in their lives. It's a transformational year, with 95% of our young people reporting that they felt more prepared for the future as a result of their mentor's support.





### **KHADIJAH AND LEVIN**

KHADIJAH: I would like to become an illustrator. The best bit of mentoring is being able to talk to somebody who has like-minded ideas and gives good advice.

Arts Emergency has really helped me to get up on my feet and gave me confidence in my work.

LEVIN: Having the chance to share in the excitement of witnessing Khadijah's artistic practice grow and to see the beautiful pieces she created was a real joy. The most rewarding thing was the way Khadijah took ownership of her journey and challenged herself to advance her artistic technique and content. It was very inspiring to understand the pieces through her perspective and narrative.

DEJI: This year I learnt how the film industry works at a basic level and how if I want to succeed I'm going to have to work very hard at entry level to get where I want to be. Arts Emergency has done more for me than I ever thought possible, it has opened doors I thought were closed. It has given me hope.

YOAV: Deji has an amazing passion and hunger to learn and grow. He's an excellent writer and it's been a treat to see his script go from strength to strength and impress industry professionals. We also drove really hard for exciting work experience opportunities – at post-production/edit houses and on-set experience. Deji stepped up to the plate every time.

66 Students have really committed to the scheme gaining insight into their chosen career and establishing excellent networks to help them in the future. They are far more confident in pursuing what really interests them in the arts and we have seen them progress on to some really creative courses and jobs. ??

# ACCESS TO HIGHER EDUCATION FOR ALL

Arts Emergency supports young people into university and beyond. Our participants can now be found at universities across the UK.

We are founded on the conviction that everyone should have the opportunity to pursue the subject areas they're interested in and that culture is for everyone.

Statistics show a degree doubles the chances of working-class students being able to attain creative and cultural careers, so our focus is on increasing access and understanding of higher education. We provide practical help with the UCAS process and support student retention at university through pastoral care and additional opportunities.


### Sadia is studying Photography at Falmouth University

We offer a wide variety of trips, tickets, networking opportunities, workshops, advice and courses.

We spotlight the many paths available in the cultural and creative industries showing young people how they might carve out a career for themselves. We encourage visits to creative workplaces and participation in arts and cultural events, regularly offering free tickets to exhibitions, plays and gigs. As a result of our programme, 69% of mentees feel more at ease in cultural spaces like galleries, museums and theatres, and this is an area of activity we will develop further in 2019.







# **BREAKING INTO INDUSTRY**

## We are supporting young people long-term into careers they love.

The work we're doing is making a difference. We know this because we're beginning to see our talented young people grow in confidence and connections and start their careers. Out of the 22 young people who took part in our 2012 pilot project 21 have recently graduated from university and half of them are already working at cultural institutions including The Royal Opera House, HBO, Netflix, the BBC and NME.

Young people from privileged backgrounds are over five times more likely to attend university and four times more likely to make it into the creative and cultural industries.

Arts Emergency is how we're helping to change this. We are an open door into the world of culture, learning and creativity, underpinned by long-term personal and practical support.

We now work in 30 schools and colleges across Greater London, Greater Manchester and East Kent. You've seen how life changing and unique our project is and we're so, so proud of all our young people. But there are 30 other towns and cities where we've already got volunteers waiting to go, and we need donations now.

- 1. There are things that are bigger and better than money. We have things that those in power will never understand.
- 2. We take it as a given that a civilised society values education, lifelong learning and creativity as a public good.
- 3. We are a social justice not social mobility organisation. Arts Emergency is no substitute for justice withheld.
- 4. Be fearless. You are just as entitled as anyone to have the life you want.
- 5. There is no recession of the imagination.
- 6. The future is another place. Allow yourself to believe a better life is possible. Say it loud, defiantly, to everyone.
- 7. To think creatively and critically is to free yourself from the limits of circumstance, class and context.
- 8. Be generous. Now be more generous. Share your privilege.
- 9. Do something. Start small, start local, keep going.
- 10. Optimism is a weapon and if all else fails be silly.
